Recent Awards

Catalyst Grant

Last November, WASK was thrilled to receive a 2023 Catalyst Grant from Kennebec Savings Bank. This grant of \$30K, awarded over three years, is committed to upgrading and improving the heart of operations - our kitchen! Our staff put great thought into how best to improve operations and two issues stood out - capacity and efficiency. The Lighthouse kitchen now has a new high BTU 6-burner stove, reducing the time for large pots to boil thus increasing the amount of pasta or soup we can produce. We also added much needed automation with more commercial, mechanical food prep equipment to significantly decrease the time required to produce delicious, healthy, and plentiful meals. When a single meal calls for 120 lbs. of potatoes, mechanical help with peeling them is key. These wonderful and welcome improvements will help us feed our grateful community for many years to come.

We at The Lighthouse know how critical a role Carla plays in day-to-day operations. In addition to being our Board of Directors President, she is 'hands-on' almost every day. There is no task at the Lighthouse that Carla doesn't tackle. She orders supplies, picks up donations, organizes volunteers, interfaces with social service agencies, represents WASK throughout the community, and addresses Waterville City Council meetings. She mops floors, does laundry, hauls trash, and cleans. She decorates the dining room, fields questions, and schedules repairs and services. Jumping in wherever needed, we all know that Carla prefers to spend time talking to our guests.

In the two years that the Lighthouse has been Carla open, has established herself as a critical resource to many among the vulnerable in local Waterville community. People ask for Carla daily, and she knows all by name. To some, she offers simple, concrete help bandage, a pair of socks, a hat, a ride to the clinic. To others, she offers less



tangible yet more critical help. She will sit and listen. She may offer advice if it's needed, or a hug or prayer when its welcomed. She has cried with many. What she does not do is judge – not ever.

Carla's gift is that of loving acceptance and genuine welcome of everyone, in any circumstance. She is a consistent presence who filters out the nonsense and honors what is real – the humanity in everyone. Thank you, Carla, – for all you do.

Emergency Warming Center Update

We Made It Through Another Maine Winter!

While it was relatively mild for most of us, it was long and difficult for those without a home. In January we extended our hours to include afternoons, to help the most vulnerable in our community stay warm and safe. In addition to providing a warm refuge, we expanded relationships with partners who bring services to our guests. We have hosted job and substance abuse counseling, mental health providers, social work case management, and art therapy, with hope that convenience will enable people to connect with services and make positive changes in their lives.

We have welcomed Operation Hope, OPTIONS, Career Center, Maine General Harm Reduction, Family Planning, community para-medicine, and Maine General SNAP nutrition, among others. As winter abates, we plan to keep our afternoon hours, continuing to connect people and services. We have met with Faye Nicholson and other representatives of REM and hope to collaborate going forward. We are grateful to Jackie Dalton for her extensive service at the warming center, and we excitedly look forward to forging a path of opportunity to happier and healthier living for those in our Lighthouse community.
